Confirmed Reports of Mountain Lions in Massachusetts

What is a "Confirmed" Record?

Because the Division of Fisheries and Wildlife is a sciencebased agency, it uses evidence-based criteria for confirming Mountain Lion reports. The criteria are based on a system developed by <u>The Cougar Network</u>. Two classes of Mountain Lion confirmation are recognized:

Class 1 Confirmations - evidence requirements:

1. The body of a dead mountain Lion, or a live wild-captured animal, is available for examination.

2. Photos, including video, in which a Mountain Lion can be identified and the location can be confirmed.

3. DNA evidence from hair, scat, etc. is available for analysis, preferably by two independent labs.

Class 2 Confirmations - evidence requirements:

1. Track sets, or photos of track sets, verified by two qualified professionals approved by MassWildlife.

2. Other tangible physical evidence verified by two qualified professionals approved by MassWildlife (i.e., prey carcasses, microscopic hair recognition, etc.).

Confirmed Reports of Mountain Lions in Massachusetts Although there have been many reports, there are two records of Mountain Lions in Massachusetts that meet the evidence requirement for a Class1 or a Class 2 Confirmation (see above). To date, other reports accompanied by evidence have either been determined to be another species of animal, or have been impossible to identify due to the poor quality of evidence. Mountain Lion reports without any form of evidence

cannot be investigated or confirmed.

Case 1

In April 1997, John McCarter, an experienced tracker who had been trained by Paul Rezendes, found scat near a cached beaver carcass at the Quabbin Reservation. The beaver was partially eaten and covered with brush. A scat sample was sent to Dr. George Amato of the Wildlife Conservation Society in New York and Dr. Melanie Culver of the University of Maryland for DNA analysis. Both labs confirmed that the sample came from a Mountain lion. This record has been accepted by MassWildlife and the Cougar Network as a Class 1 Confirmation. At that time the technology was not available for the lab to do a DNA profile to determine a more precise geographic origin of this animal.

Case 2

On March 4, 2011, Steve Ward, a DCR forester, photographed a track trail in the snow crossing a frozen cove near the Gate 8 boat launch area of Quabbin Reservoir. These tracks were fresh and well photographed. The photos were examined by tracking experts Paul Rezendes of MA, Charles Worsham of VA, George Leoniak of VT, and Dr. Mark Elbroch of WY. These tracks may well have been made by the young male Mountain Lion that was documented by DNA at Lake George, New York on December 16, 2010 and next by DNA and photos in Greenwich, CT on June 5, 2011, and killed by a vehicle six days later (<u>See more below</u>).

The "Connecticut Mountain Lion"

By far, the best documented wild Mountain Lion in New England was a young adult male (140 pounds) struck and killed by an SUV on the Wilbur Cross Parkway (Route 15) in Milford, Connecticut on June 11, 2011. The animal had been photographed on the campus of the Brunswick School, in Greenwich, Connecticut about 40 miles away on June 5th. An analysis of this cat's DNA by USDA's Forest Service Wildlife Genetics Laboratory in Missoula, Montana revealed that it had originated in South Dakota. Amazingly, this same animal was documented by DNA samples from one site in Minnesota and three locations in Wisconsin from December 11, 2009 through early 2010. At least six sightings of what is believed to be this same animal were recorded from Minnesota, Wisconsin, and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan. Later it was documented in Lake George, New York on December 16, 2010. Over a period of a year and a half, this Mountain Lion left DNA evidence (in the form of hair or scat) in at least four states, as well as identifiable tracks, trail camera photos, other photos, and finally, a body.

While mountain lions don't usually disperse more than 100 miles from where they are born, this young male traveled about 1,800 miles. This is the longest documented dispersal distance of a Mountain Lion. The previous record was set by another young Mountain Lion from South Dakota that was killed in Chicago in 2008 after travelling over 1,000 miles.

MassWildlife – Central District

TROUT STOCKING – Central District trout stocking was completed at the end of May. Staff logged more than 4,500 miles and 500 man hours during the month to move fish from the four MassWildlife trout hatcheries in Belchertown, Sunderland, Montague and Sandwich to Worcester County waters. The District office and MassWildlife Facebook page have received many favorable comments on the quality of both the fish and fishing that the stocking effort provides.

BIG ALUM POND – The District received several calls about construction equipment being parked at the Big Alum Pond boat ramp in Sturbridge. The equipment was taking up a significant amount of ramp parking. According to the Office of Fishing and Boating Access the equipment was being staged for a nearby project on the Massachusetts Turnpike but the contractor had not been authorized to use the parking area. Alternative arrangements will be made for the equipment and it is in the process of being removed.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS – The parties responsible for illegally cutting trees at the **Moose Hill WMA** have complied with the terms provided by the District and approved by the Leicester Conservation Commission. Representatives from the Leicester Snowmobile Club acquired shrubs from New England Wetland Plants in Amherst and planted them with guidance from District staff.

A timber harvesting contract has been awarded at the **Muddy Brook WMA** and work has begun on site. Select trees are being removed to expand the pitch pine scrub oak barrens habitat that is found along Muddy Brook itself. The area will be managed with the application of prescribed fire in the future. The work will ultimately benefit woodcock, wild turkey, deer, migratory song birds and a host of invertebrates and

The Hubbardston Conservation Commission authorized the lowering of **Williamsville Pond** as the top section of the wooden portion of the MassWildlife owned dam was failing. A contractor, on call with the Office of Dam Safety, met with the District and a consulting engineer at the dam to discuss options. The contractor ultimately cut away the failing sections of the dam which lowered the water level by about 20 inches. Alternatives for addressing the remaining wooden portion of the dam are being considered.

The District attended a meeting at the **Merrill Ponds WMA** in Sutton where plans to replace two failing dams with functional culverts are nearing completion. The Sutton Highway Department and Tighe and Bond engineers were on hand to discuss the culverts that will be built under West Sutton Road and Hutchinson Road to handle the flow of Singletary Brook.

BLACK BEAR PROJECT – The District is winding down efforts to capture and collar female black bear. On two occasions a known female has shown interest in one of the culvert traps but the traps had been tripped earlier in the night by hungry raccoons so the traps were closed. At another trap site a large male bear rolled the culvert trap over to free the contents without having to enter it. Bear reports are still welcome at the District, particularly those of a collared and/or ear tagged animal.

BALD EAGLE PROJECT – District staff were joined by climber Kurt Palmateer, who works as an Assistant Fish Culturist at the McLaughlin Hatchery in Belchertown, to band bald eagle chicks in Worcester County. A total of 9 chicks were banded at 5 active nests at Quabbin Reservoir (3 nests), Lake Shirley and Lake Quinsigamond. A total of 7 additional chicks were also produced at active nests at Wachusett Reservoir, Wachusett Lake, Quaboag Pond, Riverdale Pond and Webster Lake, but were not banded due to the condition of the nest tree or time and manpower constraints.

TURKEY SEASON – Figures for the 2017 spring turkey season will be available in July after data from traditional check stations is entered and analyzed. Turkey Project Leader Dave Scarpitti advises that reports for this year's Turkey Brood Survey will be particularly important given the unseasonably cold and wet weather that occurred during the nesting season. The link to the Turkey Brood Survey is available on the MassWildlife website and sportsmen and women are encouraged to participate.

LAND ACQUISITION – Land Agent James McCarthy reports adding 35 acres to the Muddy Brook WMA in Hardwick where the East Quabbin Land Trust pre-acquired the property for MassWildlife and expedited the process. In Winchendon 175 acres was added to the Benjamin Hill WMA using a Landscape

PRESCRIBED FIRE TRAINING – Five District staff participated in a prescribed fire training session held jointly with DCR at the Cronin Field Headquarters building in Westboro. The training consisted of classroom and field exercises as well as a two mile fitness walk with weighted backpack.

PEREGRINE FALCONS – The nesting peregrine falcons in downtown Worcester hatched one chick but then disappeared from their nest site. No evidence of the chick or unhatched eggs was located on the building ledge, roof or on the ground. Reports of peregrines in Milford and Leominster were not confirmed.

FIELD HEADQUARTERS OPEN HOUSE – The June 10th Field Headquarters Open House attracted close to 2,000 visitors. The event was coordinated with the town of Westboro's 300th anniversary celebration which included other attractions around the town and a fireworks display over Chauncy Pond that night. MassWildlife had fisheries and wildlife equipment on display and rooms full of fish, wildlife, amphibian, reptile and other animal information and activities. MassWildlife hats were provided to the first 1,500 visitors and a kayak given away in a free raffle. Approximately 80 MassWildlife staff participated from across the state and many familiar faces from the Worcester County League were on hand as well. Best wishes for the summer.

MassWildlife – Central District Activities – July 2017 As provided to the Worcester County League of Sportsmen's Clubs



COMMISSIONER GEORGE N. PETERSON, JR. -

Commissioner George Peterson has announced his retirement after heading up the Department of Fish and Game for two and a half years. He previously served in the House of Representatives and has always been a strong advocate for habitat conservation and management, land protection and wildlife related recreation, particularly hunting and fishing. EOEEA Secretary Matthew Beaton announced that George would be succeeded by Ron Amidon of Templeton. Ron is a lifelong sportsman who has been very active with GOAL, the Worcester County League of Sportsmen's Clubs, Trout Unlimited, Ducks Unlimited and the Otter River Sportsmen's Club. It is with gratitude that we wish George Peterson the best of luck in his retirement and with pleasure and confidence that we welcome Ron Amidon on board.

CLUB PHEASANT PROGRAM – During the week of July 10 more than 2,000 young pheasants were delivered by the District to the Brookfield, Otter River, Royalston, Auburn, Century, Rutland, Webster, Singletary and 200 Sportsmen's Clubs. Another 2,000 pheasants will be reared by the Worcester County Jail and North Worcester County Correctional Institution. All birds will be released by the participating clubs on their property or other property that is open to public hunting during the six week fall upland bird season.

STREAM SURVEYS – District staff recently conducted electrofishing stream surveys in Holden, Sterling, Princeton, North Brookfield, Boylston and Berlin. The data collected is added to the statwide database to identify cold water resources where native eastern brook trout are found. Additional surveys in the Nashua River basin are being planned.

CANADA GOOSE BANDING – District staff assisted Waterfowl Project Leader H Heusmann by banding 150 Canada geese at 13 sites in Worcester County over a two day period. The banding effort contributes data that is used to set goose season dates in Massachusetts and throughout the Atlantic Flyway.

WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREAS – The District participated in a site visit at **Birch Hill WMA** with incoming Commissioner Ron Amidon, Board members Bonnie Booth and Mike Roche, Habitat Project Leader John Scanlon and others, to discuss

future management projects to create habitat diversity and improve hunting opportunities. The work will be done in cooperation with DCR and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

District staff met with Habitat Project Leader John Scanlon at the **MacCallum WMA** in Westboro to discuss current management efforts and future work to create habitat management demonstration units.

A significant dump site was identified by the Phillipston Police Department at the **Millers River WMA**. A Phillipston Officer met with MassWildlife staff and agreed to serve written notice to the responsible party allowing 10 days for removal of a vehicle and construction debris from state property. A follow up site visit by the District revealed progress was being made.

District staff discovered an area where yard wastes and other fill was being dumped in a wetland at the **Bolton Flats WMA**. A trail camera was set and a vehicle identified making multiple trips in and out of the property. The violations are being addressed by the Environmental Police and Bolton Conservation Commission.

Timber harvesting has been completed at the **Muddy Brook WMA** in Hardwick. As an added benefit to the habitat improvement project the District is constructing a winter den site for black racers, a harmless but often persecuted snake that winters below the frost line in rocky areas. Staff has also enjoyed seeing turkey, deer, hawks and various songbirds, all of which are taking advantage of the recent management efforts.

BLACK BEAR PROJECT – District staff successfully barrel trapped a 300+ pound male bear, immobilized it, ear tagged it and released it on site in Paxton. Efforts to trap a collared female continue with sightings being called in from residents and local police departments. Bear reports are always welcome at the District, particularly those of a collared and/or ear tagged animal.

ANTLERLESS DEER PERMITS – The deadline for applying for an antlerless deer permit in any of the 15 statewide Wildlife Management Zones is July 16. Applicants may check the online MassFishHunt website after July 31 to see if they were selected for a permit. Successful applicants may purchase and print their permit online or visit a license vendor or MassWildlife office. Permit allocations for 2017 will be the same as in 2016 with 1,250 available in Zone 5; 300 in Zone 6; 2,250 in Zone 7: 2,500 in Zone 8 and 4,100 in Zone 9.

BALD EAGLE UPDATE – One of two bald eagle chicks produced by the nesting pair at Lake Quinsigamond in Shrewsbury fledged from the nest but was not cared for by the adults and became weakened. Environmental Police Officers responded and transported the bird to Tufts Wildlife Clinic in

Grafton for rehabilitation. Options for release back to the wild will be considered when the bird gains weight and strength.

LAND ACQUISITION – Fifty-four acres were added to the Millers River WMA in Royalston and 10 more acres added in Athol before the close of the state fiscal year. The Royalston acquisition was made using 100% Land Stamp revenues. Statewide, some 4,231 acres were protected jointly by MassWildlife and the Department of Fish and Game using a combination of Environmental Bond Funds and \$1.45 million in Land Stamp monies. Fifty-one land protection projects were completed, seven of which were in Worcester County.

PRESCRIBED FIRE PLANNING – Prescribed burn plans have been completed for two units at the Muddy Brook WMA. The units are located to both the east and west of Muddy Brook itself. The burning will maintain and enhance the habitat created by the recent forestry activities.

To nesting success can vary annually in response to weat conditions, predator populations, and habitat characte Citizen involvement in this survey is a cost-effective m gathering useful data, and can be a fun way for people connect with nature. Be sure to look carefully when co turkey broods, the very small poults may be difficult to tall grass or brush. MassWildlife is interested in turkey observations from all regions of the state, including ru developed areas.
